
# **Book Club Adventure!**

\*\*This task will be an ongoing reading task that will take **4 weeks** to complete. You will choose **Book Club Adventure** as a reading choice on your Choice Board for the next 4 weeks. \*\*

Hey Kids! Welcome to the Book Club Adventure Experience!

For this task, you will get to choose a chapter book to read and explore. You can choose a chapter book from your home, or you can go on to Epic Reading by following this link <a href="www.getepic.com">www.getepic.com</a> to access a HUGE online library FULL of fantastic choices.



### **The Five Finger Rule**

Step 1: CHOOSE a book you want to read.

Step 2: Open the book to the MIDDLE.

Step 3: READ the **entire** page.


Step 4: For every word that <u>you don't know or have trouble sounding out</u>, put up a FINGER as you read.

0-1 Fingers Too Easy

# 2-3 Fingers Just Right

4 Fingers: Challenging

5+ Fingers Too Hard



Now that you have chosen a book, we need to figure out how many pages you will need to read each week. We will use division to do this!

We are going to do 4 weeks' worth of reading, so we need to divide the book into 4 sections. We do this by counting how many **total pages** are in our book and **dividing that number by 4**.

Example: If my book has 100 total pages, I will calculate 100 divided by 4. My answer is 25. This means, I need to read 25 pages each week. Now, let's go!

# **Book Club Adventure - Week One -**



Our first Reading Strategy we will be exploring is Making Predictions.

Take a look at the helpful poster below to get some background information about what Making Predictions means! I'll let you read it and I'll meet you at the top of the next page!

# Making Predictions

A prediction is a guess about what will happen next in the story. You can use pictures or text clues to help you make your predictions

## Here are some ways to start your predictions:

- I predict that...
- I think \_\_\_\_ will happen because....
- When I read \_\_\_\_\_, it makes me think \_\_\_\_\_ will happen.
- I bet the character will...
- I wonder if \_\_\_\_\_ will happen next.

# When can I make a prediction?

Before Reading	Look at the title and the pictures to help you make predictions.
During Reading	Stop every few pages to make a prediction about what will happen next.
After Reading	Think: Did I make accurate predictions? What clues helped me predict what would happen next?

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Welcome back!

Now we know that a prediction is a guess about what will happen in the story. This week, we are going to make predictions **3 different times.** 

Before we start reading our book, we are going to make a **Before Reading** prediction. For this task, we will do a Book Cover of Predictions!



# **Book Cover of Predictions - Before Reading -**

1. Directions: Look at the cover of the book you are about to read. In the box below, write some phrases (you can add pictures, too) to show what you predict this book might be about, who the characters are and where the story might take place.
